Governance, management The group is managed by a voluntary Committee. They have developed from a neighborhood network into a more formal organisation. They are very well organised and efficient and have provided quality information to support their application. They have a high quality policy and processes manual, which they have supplied with the application.

Services, activities KPKT was formed in 2000 by a group of Kaiti residents that wanted to make Kaiti an even better place to live. The Trust are becoming the link to working with the low socio economic neighborhood in which they operate.

Over the years, they have completed a number of community projects and events and have provided residents with opportunities to have a say in local decisions. Last year, they ran 12 large community events this year and a weekly chess club for young people.

Governance, management The autonomous Trust is governed by a voluntary board of 6. It is affiliated to Te Ora Hou Aotearoa, which is a network of faith based Maori youth and community development. A youth worker is employed to work with young people.

Services, activities Te Ora Hou works with young people, their whanau, and communities. It runs boys and girls clubs in Kaiti to provide positive, structured activities and leadership development for approximately 30 local young people. They also provide youth mentoring, whanau support, wrap-around services for at-risk youth, and support for teenage mothers.

Purpose To supply and lay an artificial playing surface to support, foster and promote the development of hockey and cricket players and the participation and development of the Gisborne public in other sports.

Governance, management The Turf Trust is managed by three local Trustees (which include the General Manager from Eastland Community Trust). An external trust was required as hockey did not have the capability to do this and the region had been without a turf for many years. The Poverty Bay Hockey Association is responsible for operating the turf, including bookings.

Services, activities A new \$1.9M turf was installed in 2015. The Trust is responsible for the artificial hockey turf in Gisborne. This included construction, maintenance, and renewal activities. Facilities include the turf, floodlights, and grand stand. It is located at the Harry Barker Reserve on land owned by the Council. The Trust will also take on any new cricket facilities that are built at the ground (Stage 3+ of developments – yet unbuilt).

Comment	<p>ECCT's donation was to help build an \$1.1M exhibition house next to the Museum to House one of the most extensive Maori contemporary oral histories, is a significant symbol of the contributions of the C Company of the 28 Maori Battalion.</p> <p>This project entailed the construction of an exhibition house next to Tairāwhiti Museum - planned to open for Anzac day 2013. Three Iwi contributed \$150k each to the project, with the Minister for Arts, Culture and Heritage committing an additional \$500k.</p> <p>The development and design work of the building, research conducted by Monty Soutar (Improving Bi cultural Relationships - the C Company 28 Maori Battalion collection and exhibition at Gisborne Museum and Arts Centre) and the Resource Consent process has ensured that this project has been well discussed and documented for it to now be in a position to secure the balance of funding required and look at commencing the construction.</p> <p>This project along with the development at Gisborne Museum demonstrate the value the Tairāwhiti region places in its history. The wider project entails the land preparation, construction of the building and fitout, landscaping and carving and development of pou and artwork.</p>
